What is an Ethical Dilemma?

An ethical dilemma is a conflict of human values affecting the well-being of another individual (s).

There are many different values which can affect how Ethical Decisions are made. Such values are:

Personal: Beliefs about what is morally right; shaped by family, society, religion, education, culture, environment, and life events.

(Integrity and Character)

Professtional: Publically stated norms that guide practice.


(Responsibility and Accountability)

Organizational: Explicitly or implicitly stated values that guide managerial decisions.



Steps taken when making an Ethical Decision

- 1. Identify the problem
- 2. Identify the stakeholders
- 3. Gather the facts
- 4. Identify/Evaluate possible solutions
- 5. Strive for consensus
- 6. Make a decision
- 7. Implement
- 8. Reconsider periodically



Principles of Ethical Decision Making

Autonomy: Rational persons should make their own decisions

Paternalism: Others make decisions in the best interest of incapable person. (POA)

Beneficence: Decisions should promote good (benefit)

Non-Maleficence: Decisions should prevent harm

Confidentiality: Must keep information private

Veracity: Must have all relevant and truthful information

Fidelity: Must act in accordance with professional roles

Distributive Justice: Equal access to resources

Procedural Justice: Shared decisionmaking including everyone affected by decision (Respecting difference, ______ providing enough time)
